Seems the older I get, the more friends I lose. Some moved away, some just faded away ... and some have passed away. I've seen my circle diminish since I retired several years ago. And then COVID hit, and everyone locked their doors. Since I joined NWWS in 2019, I've made new friends, but most are "virtual" friendships whom I've never met in person. I knew I'd meet some of these friends—and more—at PaintOut, so I signed up for the September event.

As soon as I exited I-5 south of Bellingham, I was transported to the Skagit Valley's magical landscape. I'd seen the photos of the cute, colorful cabins at the camp, and shortly after checking in, I was moving into a yellow one.

My cabin contained a comfy gueen bed and a set of bunk beds, two folding chairs, a small table, and a clothes rack with hangers. A wall heater, a ceiling light, and two screened windows completed the setup.

I took a walk to get the lay of the land. The lodge sits on a bluff with an expansive view over a lagoon, with Puget Sound beyond. A trail took me down to the lagoon and along the berm that separates it from the Sound. I picked up a few shells to sketch, and took some photos (blackberries still blooming!). Then, I returned to the lodge to paint.

For many, it was also their first time at PaintOut. It's nearly impossible to remember everyone's name when thrown into that situation, kind of like the first day in a new school.

The aroma of dinner wafted out of the kitchen, which buzzed with cooking staff. The meals every day were delicious, abundant, and much more than I could eat.

By eight o'clock, most of us retired to our cabins. I phoned my

husband, and then...l didn't know what to do with myself. It was way too early for this night-owl. The silence echoed in my ears. I hung out online for a bit, then turned out the light. Surprisingly, I slept well and was up in plenty of time for breakfast. (Hint: Consider bringing one of those camp potty buckets. Trekking desperately to the restroom at 4:00 a.m. is not my jam.)



Our days were punctuated by meals and demos on a variety of creative subjects, presented by fellow campers. I was disappointed that I didn't get to use my new plein air easel. Worse, every time I entered my cabin, I had to slay a dozen skeeters. I discovered they were riding in on me!

On Saturday, I learned that I'd have company arriving on Monday, so I left Saturday afternoon. I was happy to be home. I missed my husband, our cats, and our mosquito-free bedroom. Our company came and went. Then, something unexpected happened: I couldn't stop thinking about PaintOut. Judging by the PaintOut Facebook page, others were also experiencing "PaintOut withdrawal."

I know that February PaintOut will be mosquito-free, but likely too wet for plein air painting. I debated. But when I bought a pair of rubber boots at Costco, perfect for slogging through soggy grass to the lodge, I knew I'd made up my mind. See you on Samish Island in February! Come meet your tribe!





Sail Away With Your Brush: Painting Aboard Sky Pond #4 I've Painted Clouds from Both Sides Now

by Roxy Podlogar (#4 of 4-part series: for Parts 1, 2 & 3 see Spring, Summer, and Autumn Hot Press 2024)

Bula from Fiji!

We have visited five island nations since sailing from Mexico to the South Pacific in March 2022. Each island has unique weather patterns due to its geological makeup, location to the equator, and the influence of easterly trade winds. These variations require careful observation to paint cloudscapes convincingly.



As with most islands in the South Pacific, the eastern (windward) side, receives the majority of rain due to the wet easterly trade winds colliding with an island. In contrast, the western (leeward) side is dryer (rain shadow effect). Understanding this helps me paint complete scenes.

We explored a remote Fijian atoll, Kadavu. While waiting out a storm, we anchored behind an islet on the windward side. The rain poured down in sheets. From the protection of our cockpit, I captured the low clouds and wall of rain. Arches Hot Press paper served me well. First, I used broad brushstrokes resembling rain torrents. Then, I used my water bottle to spray the paper, holding it vertically and letting it run. Lastly, I dried it at an angle.

Volcanic island chains, like the Marquesas and French Polynesia, present tall, densely-carpeted, dark domes. Water-laden nimbus clouds cling to the rims of these giants and cast shadows on the villages tucked in below. Misty mornings are typical in these islands and, to capture this, I prepare well before daybreak. The light and colors evolve quickly. I mount several papers and work on each in unison. Usually, one captures the scene, but certainly not all of them!

The active volcanic islands of Vanuatu continuously emit clouds of ash and smoke that are carried by the trade winds, blanketing the hills downwind. The volcano's heat disrupts local cloud formations, merging their dense gray clouds with the surrounding cloud systems.

Island countries like the archipelago of the Tuamotus are comprised mainly of atolls; enclosed coral reefs that capture ocean water. This creates a lagoon, which can span miles between its reef. Here, cumulous clouds form on the edges of the reef and intermix with high cirrus clouds accompanying the trade winds. High-altitude white clouds reflect brilliant, evolving colors throughout the day.

Clouds also reflect the water and land beneath them. Some bays have dark black volcanic sand subduing the reflected light, like this bay in Raiatea, French Polynesia.

The large Fijian island of Viti Levu creates a rain shadow for the smaller islets west of it, providing conditions for dry cumulus clouds that build throughout the day as the warm island air mixes with the cooler sea air. When the sun sets, it casts intense orange, pink, and violet on the cloud columns. Until I experimented with Holbein's Jaune Brilliant, Lilac, and Lavender, my usual pallet pigments faded and failed to convey the delicate colors.

As a sailing artist, I have learned to interpret the unique atmosphere of each island and to capture the magic of my surroundings. Understanding the meteorology of a location can enhance the quality of a painting by creating a compelling cloudscape that connects seamlessly with the land. Don't just approximate the sky; take the time to truly understand it.


